To sum it up, we have the words of Jesus when He was asked about which is the greatest Commandment, meaning what is the area of life to which we must pay the most attention. He replied, "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart and with all your soul and with all your mind. This is the great and first commandment. And a second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself." (Matt. 22:37-39) If anyone hears those words and comes away believing that they will ever be able to be pleasing and acceptable to God by keeping these Commandments, they will find themselves on a treadmill which never turns off; one which is never satisfied.

The Law of God can never be satisfied by our keeping of it, because we are unable to keep it. But there is One who has kept it for us.
